VI. THE FAMILY OF MARTIN AND ELISABETHA

Joh. Adam and Catarina

Adam was born on Aug. 28, 1757, near Cleona. He served as a private in Capt. Benjamin Weiser's company of the Northumberland County military during the Revolutionary War. Adam was named in the tax lists for Mahanoy Township between 1781 and 1801, and the 1801 entry says he had 70 acres of land.¹ The last census record for Adam was in the 1800 census in Northumberland County.

Adam and his wife Catarina apparently had five sons and six daughters between about 1782 and 1805. Baptismal records from Zion's Lutheran and Reformed Church, commonly known as the Stone Valley Church, near Hickory Corners name two of the daughters: Elizabeth, born July 27, 1782, and Salome, baptized on April 12, 1805.

The last known record for Adam and Catarina was the Stone Valley Church communion records for Nov. 2, 1806, which record the couple taking communion and mention daughters Elisabetha and Magdalena.²

• The oldest of the sons was probably John, who is listed in Mahanoy Township in the 1810 census along with his wife and one son and three daughters born between 1800 and 1810. John may have been the second husband of Catharine Kuntzman, daughter of Daniel Kuntzman of Mahanoy Township.³

• Another of Adam's sons was probably Philip, who was born April 4, 1796, and died Oct. 4, 1858. His wife Christiana Wirt was born March 5, 1799, and died Oct. 14, 1877. The couple was listed in the 1850 census in Lower Mahanoy Township in Northumberland County along with their four children.

Philip, Christiana and other family members are buried in the cemetery at Stone Valley Church.⁴

Charles was born Aug. 4, 1820, and died Feb. 12, 1864. His wife Sarah was born in 1823 and died in 1864.

Harry or Henry was born July 13, 1828, and died May 3, 1899. His wife Elizabeth was born in 1834 and died in 1921. The couple had no children of their own. Harry's will, written on June 19, 1894, mentions his wife Elizabeth, his brother John and his nephew Henry. Elizabeth's will, written on May 6, 1919, does not mention any relatives.

Priscilla (Sept. 13, 1831-Sept. 29, 1910) was living with Harry and Elizabeth in 1880. Priscilla married Charles E. Broscius on June 16, 1883. Broscius apparently died before 1900. The 1900 census shows Priscilla as a housekeeper, and the 1910 census shows her living with her brother John and his family.

John (March 15, 1839-Aug. 26, 1916) married Louisa Witmer (1843-1922). In 1910, the household included sister Priscilla, daughter Jeanette and her husband Isaac Klinger and their children.

Johannes

Johannes or John was born about 1760 near Cleona and died in 1813 in Miles Township in Centre County, Pennsylvania. His wife Catarina Wolf - probably his second wife - died after 1820.⁵

Census record indicate John had seven sons and five daughters: two sons and three daughters born between about 1782 and 1790, one son and two daughters born between 1790 and 1800, and four sons born between 1800 and 1810. The wide range of birth dates suggests that the earlier and later children had different mothers.

Three other sons were Phillip, Rudolph and Peter.

Johannes was probably the John Kerstetter who served during the Revolution in Capt. John Moll's company of the militia. Moll's company was raised in the southern part of present-day Northumberland County.

John's name appears on the tax lists of Mahanoy Township between 1781 and 1787. Three of the entries mention 50 acres of land, and the 1786 entry described him as a non-resident.⁶

The family apparently moved between 1807 and 1810 to Miles Township in Centre County, probably the part of the township that later became Logan Township in Clinton County.⁷ The deaths of three of the children in late 1827 and 1828 suggest that the family may have been decimated by an epidemic.

• Martin and his wife Susan Greninger had at least one surviving child, a son named Henry born about 1820, who was named in Centre County Orphan's Court records filed in 1836.⁸ Henry was a mason. He and his wife Lydia are listed in the 1860 census in Clinton County.

• Mary Magdalena and Susan's brother Jon. Peter Greninger had seven children. After Mary Magdalena's death in 1829, Peter married Margaret Bierly. He died in Clinton County and is buried in Union Cemetery in Tylersville.⁹

Mary Elizabeth Greninger (March 26, 1813-Oct. 20, 1879) married John Womelsdorf (1813-1885). The couple is buried in Fairview Evangelical Cemetery in Loganton.

Anna Maria Greninger (April 6, 1814-April 26, 1891) married David Shrack (Sept. 10, 1814-Nov. 13, 1876) on Dec. 7, 1834. She is buried in St. John's Lutheran Cemetery in Booneville.

Susanna Margaret Greninger (Aug. 12, 1815-March 31, 1850) married Eli Oker or Ocker. The mortality schedule for 1850 said Susanna Margaret died of fever. She is buried in the Lutheran cemetery in Tylersville.

Barbara Greninger (May 7, 1817-July 17, 1881) married John or Hans Bierly (Nov. 28, 1816-Feb. 25, 1897). John was a blacksmith and was apparently known as "Red Hans." The couple was living in Tylersville in Clinton County in 1880. They are buried in Tylersville Community Cemetery.

John Peter Greninger (May 3, 1818-Feb. 10, 1894) married Elizabeth Ruhl (May 18, 1826-Nov. 1, 1872) about 1839. Sometime after 1850, the family went west. John Peter and Elizabeth are buried in the Moss Spring Cemetery in Jasper, Missouri.

Samuel E. Greninger (June 30, 1819-May 25, 1889) married Mary Ann Miller (Sept. 29, 1821-April 2, 1878). Samuel is buried in the Lutheran cemetery in Tylersville and Mary Ann in the Lutheran and Reformed Cemetery in Rebersburg.

Julian Greninger was born about 1822 and married Joh. Jacob Kahl (March 12, 1816-Dec. 11, 1887). Joh. Jacob is buried in the Reformed Cemetery in Greenburr, Clinton County.

• John and his wife Abigail or Appolonia had seven sons and four daughters - the first three of them baptized at Brush Valley Union Church in Rebersburg in Centre County. The family moved to Richland County, Ohio, about 1830. John died from a stroke in 1860, and his wife died in the 1880s.¹⁰

Anthony was born on Jan. 31, 1814. He married Mary Whitmire, born about 1820, on Dec. 8, 1844. At the time of the 1880 census, they were living in Richland County along with Abigail.

Catharine was born on Oct. 31, 1815.

Johannes or John was born on July 3, 1817. He married Mary Susan Long (Oct. 15, 1821-Aug. 30, 1896) on Oct. 1, 1840. She was the daughter of Jacob Long and Mary Elizabeth Vachell. John and Mary and their children moved from Richland County, Ohio, to Fulton County, Illinois, about 1845 and moved again to Allen County, Kansas, about 1859.

? Mary A. was born about 1828. She married John Lindsey in Richland County on March 21, 1848.

Simon was born about 1832.

David was born about 1835 and married about 1855. He and his wife Catharine and three children were living in Spring Valley Township of Rock County, Wisconsin, in 1860.

Jackson M. was born in June 1838 and married Elizabeth Russell on Jan. 17, 1860. Abigail was living with them at the time of the 1880 census. Jackson and Elizabeth and their family moved to Indiana sometime after 1880. Jackson died in 1916 in Albion, Indiana, in Noble County.

Anna Margaretha and Jacob Brosius

Anna Margaretha and Jacob Brosius had a son Joh. Jacob, who was born Sept. 12, 1786.¹¹

Elisabetha and Heinrich (Henry) Löfler

Elisabetha and Heinrich and their family lived in Northumberland County. Jannet was baptized at Himmel Church, and Elisabetha, Samuel and Michael were baptized at Stone Valley Church.¹² The couple also had children named Catharine, Margaret and John.

Jannet Löfler was born Jan. 25, 1783.

Elisabetha Löfler was born April 3, 1785.

Samuel Löfler was born Jan. 2, 1792 and died in 1874. He and his wife Rebecca (1801-1884) and their children are listed in the 1850 census in Lower Mahanoy Township in Northumberland County.

Maria Barbara or Polly Löfler was born in 1796 and died in 1815.

George Henry Löfler was born in 1798 and died in 1812.

Michael Löfler was born Nov. 20, 1802.

Rudolph and Anna Maria

Rudolph was born in the early 1770s in Northumberland County. He first appears in the census records in 1800 in Mahanoy Township near the listings for his two older brothers. A short while later, he was one of the first settlers of the area known as Sugar Valley in what later became Greene Township in Clinton County.¹³

Rudolph was listed in the 1830 and 1840 census in Pennsylvania. In 1850, he was living with his daughter Phoebe O'Daniels and her family in Stephenson County in northwestern Illinois.

Census and church records suggest Rudolph and his wife Anna Maria had five sons born between 1790 and 1810 and four daughters born between 1804 and 1820.

• Adam was probably born between 1790 and 1800. The 1830 census for Logan Township lists Adam and his wife and a girl born between 1815 and 1820. His will, dated Feb. 26, 1841, and recorded April 9, 1841, mentions his wife and an Anna Noll, who presumably worked for the couple and was described as "a girl that is bound."¹⁵

• Samuel and his wife Catharine lived in Logan Township and had five sons and one daughter between 1820 and 1830. Samuel and his son Daniel are buried in the cemetery of the old Lutheran and Reformed church about 1¹/₂ miles west of Centreville. After Samuel's death, Catharine married John Heckman (May 13, 1786-April 24, 1870). She was living with son Israel Heckman a few months later at the time of the 1870 census. Catharine is buried in St. Paul's Lutheran Cemetery in Loganton.¹⁶

William (Oct. 6, 1821-Dec. 11, 1904) married Annie Glantz (Sept. 8, 1823-Dec. 13, 1914). They are buried in the Lutheran cemetery in Tylersville. William was a carpenter.

Michael (April 30, 1823-June 5, 1883) and his wife Mary Ann Ocker (Oct. 12, 1823-Dec. 24, 1888) and their son Isway were listed in the 1880 census in Logansville in Clinton County. Michael was also a carpenter.

Israel, also a carpenter, was born Oct. 30, 1824 and died Jan. 20, 1899. His first wife Charlotte Donahue was born March 31, 1825, died Aug. 31, 1853, and is buried in the Loganton Lutheran Cemetery. He married Abigail Hockman (Aug. 24, 1835-Jan. 20, 1915) on Sept. 9, 1861. Israel and Abigail and their children were listed in the 1880 census in Crawford Township of Clinton County. The couple is buried in Limestone Cemetery in Rauchtown.

Samuel (June 23, 1826-Nov. 22, 1897) was living with his family in Ickesburg in Perry County in 1880. Samuel was a wagon maker, and his wife Mary Ann Owings

(April 7, 1827-March 6, 1887) was an innkeeper who had been born in Perry County.

Susannah (April 20, 1829-Jan. 16, 1871) married Samuel Lupold (April 20, 1829-Nov. 24, 1887). They are buried in Watsontown in Northumberland County.

Daniel was born about 1829 and died Jan. 14 or Jan. 18, 1850. He is buried in Schracktown Cemetery in Sugar Valley.

David (Nov. 20, 1830-May 23, 1866) was a blacksmith. He and his wife Hannah (1833-1903) and their son were living in Porter Township in Clinton County in 1860.

• Michael had five sons and eight daughters. His first wife Sarah died shortly after the birth and death of their 11th child Samuel. Michael also had two children with his second wife Catharine.¹⁷

Four sons and five daughters - presumably the only children surviving at the time of Michael's death - are named in his will: John, Rudolph, Robert, Dennis, Barbara, Elizabeth, Ellen, Emma and Carlista.

Louisa Ann was born Jan. 25, 1828.

John was born Oct. 31, 1829 and died July 26, 1904. He and his wife Mary Magdalena Lamey (Nov. 15, 1830-Sept. 24, 1877) were listed in the 1870 census for Logan Township in Clinton County. John was a stone mason. He served as a private in the Civil War in the 210th Company of the Pennsylvania Volunteers. He is buried in Grace Evangelical Church Cemetery in Laurelton in Union County.

Phoebe was born July 2, 1831.

Sarah was born March 25, 1833. She married John Philip Gebhart.

Rudolph (May 25, 1834-May 20, 1907) married Salome K. Beck (1845-1898). He served in the 7th Pennsylvania Cavalry during the Civil War. The family was living in Booneville in Clinton County in 1880.

Barbara was born Oct. 11, 1835.

Elizabeth was born Aug. 7, 1837.

Ellen was born Feb. 16, 1839, and married a man named Blair.

Robert Houser was born Feb. 13, 1841 and died March 21, 1922. His wife was Sarah Ann Moyer (1848-1920). The couple and their children were living in Logansville in 1880.

Dennis was born June 21, 1842.

Samuel was born Sept. 5, 1844, and died Nov. 17, 1844.

Emma or Emaline was born May 27, 1850, and married a man named Stark.

Carlista was born July 22, 1851, and married Samuel Hess, born about 1850. The family was living in Greene Township of Clinton County in 1900. Samuel was listed as widowed in the 1910 census.

• Jacob or Jake and his wife Mary Friedley, born about 1806, lived in Logansville and probably had seven sons and four daughters, including a son born between 1820 and 1825 and a daughter born between 1825 and 1830.

An article in the Jan. 2, 1873, issue of the Clinton *Democrat* said Jake as a young man was known as an excellent shot, so good that he wasn't allowed to enter local shooting matches. He was a farmer, but he yearned for action when the Civil War broke out, according to the newspaper.¹⁸

At this time, he was 54 years of age and "eager for the fray," but he was too old to get mustered in. To overcome this he reported his age as 44, entered Company C, Seventh Pennsylvania Reserves, Col. Harvey, afterwards Col. Bollinger, and served two years. In the Seven Days' fight he was injured by being trodden upon on the breast by a horse of one of Gen. Meade's aides. While lying wounded, to escape capture he rolled into a ditch, and there lay 26 hours in the hope of escaping detection; but he was nabbed and sent to Libby. After confinement for a week or so he was offered a parole, but refused to take the oath obligating him not to take up arms till regularly exchanged.

Jake returned home for a while, then decided to re-enlist. He called on the governor in Harrisburg for help, but failed to pass a physical exam and ended up buying his way back into the army for \$200.

From the peculiarities of our subject it will be readily believed that he was somewhat erratic and a little hard to keep to company duty. He yearned for sharpshooting duty, and was disposed to and did go off now and then to have a few shots all to himself. On picket duty he lost two fingers, taken off by a shot from one of Mosby's men.

Jake was in 20 or more fights and served through the battle of Cedar Creek. He later got a disability discharge.

Jake died in 1874 and is buried in the cemetery at St. Paul's Lutheran and Reformed Church in Centreville. Sons Joel and Thomas were mentioned by name in letters of administration issued for Jake's estate on Aug. 28, 1874.¹⁹

Joel was born Dec. 20, 1825, and died Oct. 15, 1889. His wife Sarah was born about 1827 and died April 5, 1875. She is buried at St. Paul's Lutheran and Reformed Church. Joel's second wife Elizabeth Breon, born about 1834, appears with the family in the 1880 census in Logansville along with two sons from her previous marriage.

Mary was born about 1827.

Sarah was born about 1829.

Jesse was born June 15, 1831, and died Jan. 17, 1850.

Reuben was born March 11, 1831, and died April 1, 1850.

Jacob was born June 14, 1834, and died Jan. 14, 1850.

Thomas was born about 1839.

Hannah was born about 1841.

Jeremiah was born about 1843. He enlisted in his father's company on Sept. 12, 1864, and was mustered out on May 30, 1865. One record lists his place of death as Marion County, Oregon.

Sons Jesse, Reuben and Jacob may have been victims of an epidemic that swept through the area in 1850. They all died in early 1850 and are buried at the old Lutheran and Reformed church near Centreville. Samuel's son Daniel also died in early 1850.

• Peter and his wife Sophia lived in Logan Township. Most of Peter's estate went to Sophia. The only children named in the will were Reuben and Annie, and each got only $$1.^{20}$

Annie was born about 1834.

Reuben was born about 1836. He and his wife Hannah and their children are listed in the 1860 census in Greene Township.

Amanda (1842-1893) married Joseph Herb (1845-1927).

Samuel was born about 1843.

Henry was born about 1844.

William was born about 1848.

Leah (Aug. 13, 1850-Dec. 19, 1941) married Perry Kleckner (Sept. 19, 1893-March 16, 1915) on July 4, 1871.

Kate was born about 1853 and died in 1854.

Lewis M. was born about 1862. He, his wife Katie A., and their children were living in Logan Township in Clinton County in 1900. Lewis' widowed mother Sophia was also living with the family.

• Sarah and Peter Beerly met in Clinton County and were married about 1836. Peter was a wagon manufacturer who worked in Clinton County until 1847, then moved the family to Centre County. The couple is buried in Advent Cemetery in Boggs Township.²¹

Robert Beerly was born Dec. 21, 1837, and died in 1901. His wife Hannah J. Worts was born in 1835. Robert was a wagon maker, a producer of cider, an amateur musician and a Republican turned Prohibitionist. The *Commemorative Biographical Record* offered this glowing testimonial: "Tireless energy, keen perception, honesty of purpose, genius for devising and executing the right thing at the right time, joined to every-day common sense, guided by resistless will power, are the chief characteristics of this man, and have been the important factors in his success."

Rebecca Beerly (1839-1922) married David Watson.

Masulam Beerly was born in 1841, joined the army and died in the Civil War in 1863.

Nathanial Beerly (1843-1887) was a merchant and justice of the peace in Central City.

Tartonlius Beerly was born in 1846. Agnes Beerly (1849-1920) married Byron Taylor.

Newton Beerly was born in 1852 and died the following year. Lemuel Beerly was born in 1858 and died in 1928.

• Phoebe and Elijah O'Daniels were married about 1836. They were living in Stephenson County, Illinois, at the time of the 1850 census and 1860 census and in Carroll County, Iowa in 1870. Elijah died in 1877, and Phoebe went to live with their son Thomas Jefferson O'Daniels and his family in Jewell County, Kansas.²²

Mary A. O'Daniels was born Oct. 24, 1837.

Franklin O'Daniels was born Sept. 2, 1841.

Julia A. O'Daniels was born about 1844.

Francis A. O'Daniels was born in September 1845.

Elijah O'Daniels Jr. was born about 1847. He and his wife Sarah Ellen and their family were living in Jewell County in 1880.

Hugh Henry O'Daniels was born in September 1851.

Thomas Jefferson O'Daniels was born in 1854. He and his wife Mary, their children and his mother Phoebe were living in Jewell County in 1880.

Anna and John Bingaman

Anna and John Bingaman had three children who were baptized at Himmel Church.²³

Anna Catarina Bingaman was born Nov. 23, 1779?

Elizabeth Bingaman was born July 4, 1782.

Johannes Bingaman was born Sept. 18, 1785.

Barbara and Catarina

Little is known about the other two daughters of Martin and Elisabetha. Barbara married William Emick or Emrich, and Catarina married John George Yeager or Yeagle.²⁴
